# Children of Prisoners: Virtual Communities Negotiating and Managing Relationships, Isolation and Stigma

Researcher: Amanda Swallow

- only 9% of children of imprisoned mothers are cared for by their fathers compared to 92% who are cared for by their mothers¹.
- 5 % of children whose mothers are in prison remain in their own homes<sup>2</sup>.
- 24% of children are cared for by grandparents<sup>3</sup>.
- between 11-15% of children are placed into care as a result of their mother's imprisonment<sup>4</sup>.

- Experiences of social exclusion (political and societal)<sup>5</sup>.
- Alleged increased risk of expressing anti-social behaviour – Recently used as a political tool<sup>6</sup>.
- Recent research found that imprisonment costs state agencies (NHS, social services) an average of £4,800 over six months, per family<sup>7</sup>.

- 66% of women in prison (4,252) have dependent children<sup>8</sup>.
- 7% (approximately 600,000) of the child population at school has an imprisoned parent, annually9.
- Under-researched!

It is suggested that 160,000 children are affected by their parents' imprisonment, annually within England and Wales<sup>10</sup>.

#### However!

There is no single statutory body dedicated to the care, welfare or support of these children. No actual data is collected & all figures quoted so far are *estimates*.

The very few researchers investigating this issue agree that there are particularly negative effects upon children who experience parental imprisonment, such as:

- Experiences of trauma (especially where a parent is arrested in the home)<sup>11</sup>.
- Mental health issues (currently being debated and investigated)<sup>12</sup>.
- May be stigmatised due to their parent's imprisonment<sup>13</sup>.

# Legislation / Policy

- Ministry of Justice introduce gender specific standards for women in prison<sup>14</sup>.
- UN Convention on the Rights of the Child 1989
   Article 9 implies the right that children have to maintain contact with imprisoned parents<sup>15</sup>.
- Human Rights Family Life Human Rights Act 1998 – Article 8 – "Respect for Private and Family Life" <sup>16</sup>.

# Legislation / Policy (Cont.)

- National Offender Management Service (NOMS policies) – Claim that children and families are the most important pathways<sup>17</sup>.
- Corston Report Four recommendations specific to female offenders, parenting and their children<sup>18</sup>.
- Every Child Matters Prisoners' children have worse outcomes than other children, in terms of health and education, amongst others<sup>19</sup>.
