

MAY YOU LIVE IN INTERESTING TIMES,

Cardiff's inaugural Festival of Creative
Technology, looks at some of the ways in
which artists are engaged with or inspired
by digital technology, exploring its use in
the context of public and shared spheres
where the technology itself is utilised as a
site for the production and presentation of
work. Although digital technology is often
claimed to go beyond physical limitations,
engagement with technology is always
embedded in real spaces, whether
this is explored from a user or network
perspective.

This three-day programme of events is a Cardiff 2005 event and has been developed by Bloc and Chapter. Bloc, Creative Technology Wales, is a pan-Wales organisation dedicated to the promotion and development of creative work using computer technology. Chapter, based in Cardiff, is one of Europe's largest arts centres incorporating a major gallery, theatre and cinemas as well as more than sixty cultural workspaces for artists and independent creative industries in Wales. Bloc and Chapter have been working together for the last eighteen months to bring you this diverse programme of activity.

The Festival includes a two-day conference, new commissions, residencies, screenings and artists' projects in public sites across the city. It also provides a platform for debate and discussion and we hope you will be able to take advantage of the many social and networking events that form an important part of the programme (see Social Spaces on page 11).

This brochure is designed to make navigation easy across our busy itinerary. For quick reference, each event listed in this guide is numbered and cross-referenced on the map on the back page so that you will know exactly where it is taking place.

We also have two Festival information Hubs. The first is based at Chapter, where our exciting conference and screenings programme is taking place. The second Hub is at G39 (contemporary temporary artspace) on Mill Lane, and provides a central information point as you view projects in the city centre.



Renowned internationally as one of the most adventurous artists' groups using interactive media, Blast Theory present the award-winning chase game *Can You See Me Now?* Online players are dropped into a virtual Cardiff while Blast Theory runners, tracked by satellites in the real city, pursue them.

Chapter, Cardiff (3)

Grennan & Sperandio will begin their residency at Chapter, researching and producing a new card game based on the history of Cardiff. Throughout the residency they will interact with historians, language experts, game enthusiasts and people from all walks of life in Cardiff. Games are a social opportunity for mixing, as well as a place for private imaginations to bloom.

The rules of the game will be play tested in a laboratory setting with card game enthusiasts and volunteers recruited for this purpose. The residency studio then becomes a gaming school. Passersby will have the opportunity to learn about the iconography and history, play the game casually or participate in ongoing tournaments. During the residency (which continues into 2006) work will focus on the digital implementation of the game in an online form. Grounded in the real, the game will spread via the virtual - a new planting of digital roots. Prizes, decks of cards and local acclaim will be handed out to the winners.

This new game is intended both as a mirror and a portrait of the capital of Wales in the 21st century.

Satellite Bureau artists Jen Hamilton and Jen Southern took Global Positioning System technology to the West Wales community of Cardigan in Ceredigion during their residency at Creative Mwldan this summer. Through the agency of Satellite Bureau their aim was to visualise and investigate the technological 'drawn line' in expressing the precision of data and the poetry and politics of subjective experience of environment.

Hamilton and Southern will be launching a new audioinstallation *Ebb and Flow* as a reflection of their Cardigan work. This one-time event takes place on the Cardiff Habour Water Bus, leaving Mermaid Quay at 5.30pm on Friday 28 October.

Michelle Teran, Life: A User's Manual

Saturday 29 October, 7.00-8.00pm

Moving through the city streets, a video scanner reveals a hidden layer of personal fragments and stories which are broadcast by the private owners of surveillance cameras. The accumulation of these autonomous yet synchronous acts contributes to an invisible ad-hoc network of media permeating the social spaces within Cardiff city-centre and Bay areas: the café, the office, the shop, the car park and the street. Life: A User's Manual is a shared experience in visualising the invisible.


Together with the participants, Michelle Teran will walk through Cardiff streets with a wireless surveillance camera scanner and will broadcast live images from the city.

The paintings and installations of Andy Fung are ambiguous references to youth and contemporary culture within gallery and street contexts. Whilst appearing to be computer generated, the work is hand drawn, using imagery that refers to the limitless possibilities of both nature and the proliferation of digital technology.

Andy has created a large-scale billboard presentation on an advertising site just five minutes walk from the Festival Hubat Chapter.

Artstation (artists Glenn Davidson and Anne Hayes) will host an open studio during the festival, discussing and developing their latest project *ArtWap*, looking at the contribution made by artists and the public to the interpretation of landscape.

ArtMap functions as an additional layer in which a user can locate digital art projects - web-based media, sound, images, video, text, graphics and links to promote a greater sensitivity and understanding of our surrounding environment. ArtMap could act as a nationwide framework within which art can speak about location and geo-specificity and gain a wider sphere of public contact

During their Open Studio event, Artstation will host a number of informal talks and workshops with invited speakers and contributors including Dr Mark Palmer, UWE, and will also facilitate a Tenantspin presentation on Friday 28 October at 7pm (see page 10).





Mike Mills' short films and documentary works are underpinned by a fascination with American social values and exude a sense of wistful nostalgia and timelessness. His characters and interviewees exist on the peripheries, both physically and emotionally. The characters are chiefly on the cusp of childhood and adulthood, occupying the adolescent no-man's land of insecurity and self-consciousness. Mills gently critiques the foundation and myths of the American Dream and the hollow aspirations and value systems that form it. Film selection includes An introduction to Harmolodics, Paperboys, The architecture of reassurance and Deformer.

Festival Hubs:

There are two Festival Hubs, the first is at Chapter, Cardiff. Chapter is situated in Canton, behind Cowbridge Road East, between Llandaff Road and Market Road. Chapter is easily accessible from the city centre with it's own car park at the rear of the building and by numbers 17, 18 + 31 buses every 5 minutes from Cardiff Central. By road to Chapter:

If you are coming from M4 East (London) leave the M4 at junction 29 and follow signs onto A48 (M). Continue on the A48 passing Cardiff Gate, Pentwyn, Cardiff East/Docks and Cardiff Central. Continue along the A48, you will pass a large TESCO superstore on your left and University of Wales College (Llandaff) on your right. Take the next slip road sign posted Llandaff/Llantrisant. At the traffic lights turn left. The next set of traffic lights you come to, you will need to be in the right hand lane, go straight on into Llandaff Rd. You will come to another set of traffic lights, continue on, then take the second right turning into Market Place. The Butchers Arms pub is on the corner, you will see Chapter on the right. Disabled Parking is in the front of the building, large free public car park at the rear of the building.

If you are coming from M4 West (Swansea) leave the M4 at junction 33 and follow the signs for Penarth/Barry, passing St Fagans (Welsh National Folk Museum), Ely/Cardiff West, take the Leckwith/Athletic Stadium junction. Take the first left off the roundabout passing the stadium on your right, continue on through two sets of traffic lights. At the third set of traffic lights go straight across, The Corporation pub will be on your left, take the next left turning into Market Place. The Butchers Arms pub is on the corner, you will see

By road to G39:

If you are coming from M4 East (London), leave the M4 at junction 29 and join the A48 (M). Leave at the third exit (signposted Cardiff West and Docks). Follow signs to Cardiff City Centre.

If you are coming from M4 West (Swansea) leave the M4 at junction 32 and join the A470 to Cardiff City centre.






























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
